### The Gresham & Estacada Canning Company.

How would that title sound, if the following proposed plans carry?

H. E. Davis of Gresham, the president of the Gresham Fruit Grower's Assn. and of the canning company, was an Estacada visitor last Tuesday.

Mr. Davis is a practical farmer and fruit grower of years experience and is at present operating the big W. W. Cotton ranch.

He reports that the Gresham cannery building is built, at a cost of \$4000, and that over \$8000, of the \$15000, capitalization has been paid in.

The cannery will begin operating next spring and Mr. Davis is arranging for the necessary fruits and vegetables to work on, besides the amount which will come from the Gresham country.

Mr. Davis suggested that possibly growers from Estacada and other points along the line, could be interested in joining their cooperative association and share in the profits, as well as profit by the sale of their produce. Such a plan might be worked out, with an arrangement to establish an Estacada cannery, when the local planting has increased sufficiently.

The coming season they expect to can Gold Dollar and Clarke's Seedling strawberries; Cutbert and Antwerp, red raspberries; Evergreen blackberries; Bartlett pears; Green gage plums; Kentish, Early Richmond, Royal Ann, Bing and Lambert cherries; gooseberries; currants; apples, for cider and canning; Refugee and Kentucky Wonder beans.

The growers in this section should at least be willing to plant and sell their produce and if an arrangement can be made to ultimately get a cannery here, some of the people would probably buy a share of stock.

At a later date, it is likely that a meeting will be held in Estacada, to consider a union of some sort, with our neighboring growers.

The Progress hopes to soon print a list of the prices that were paid the past season, for the above products, by the Puyallup, Wash. cooperative cannery. If you are interested in this proposition, kindly advise this office or Mr. Davis.

### Monument Fallen

Last week, Clark Posson of Estacada, felled the 60 foot brick chimney, which has so long been a landmark, on the Terrace Addition flat, marking the finish of Estacada's commercial supremacy, as a ceramic manufacturing center.

Clark is renovating the 50,000 odd bricks and getting them back into their original shape, for active service in live industries.

Each of these bricks, represents a certain amount of Estacada's investor's money, but it was not the investors who were to blame for the collapse of the original brick making business.

### Foot Ball

One dollar's worth for two bits was the reward obtained by the lucky spectators of last Saturday's game, between Estacada High School and St Johns.

The St Johns team was the strongest aggregation that Estacada has tackled yet, having beaten Gresham and other fast teams.

Most of the spectators had looked for a walk-over on the part of the visitors, owing to the new line up for the locals, but were agreeably surprised to see that Estacada had improved 200% since their former game.

Estacada lost by the score of 13 to 6. The visitors played fast, snappy ball every minute and their forward passes and trick plays, gained them the majority of their yardage. Estacada had the stronger line and, at straight, old fashioned foot ball, had the better of it.

Every man on the local team played a star part and the new ends, Johnson and Bartlemay are fast and nifty. Plays should be arranged to allow these two men to carry the ball, as their speed should count. The backs did more than their share of defensive and offensive work, with good punting by Dale.

Estacada played too much on the defensive in the last half, and had they taken the offensive and not punted on their first down, when they were safe by from 10 to 30 yards, they probably would have tied the score. In the last half, Estacada had but five yards to go and on a first down, tried a forward pass, which failed, and substantially ended their chances. Inasmuch as Estacada could make gains through St Johns line, they should have resorted to line plunging for at least three downs, before trying a pass in such crowded quarters.

Estacada should win their game against Oregon City, at Estacada, Nov. 21st, if they will play as they did last Saturday, with the addition of a few trick or fake plays. More attention should be given to the issuing of the signals, to pound a given weak point, and more field generalship is needed. The tackling was still a little high but no fumbling occurred.

### Prohibition Celebration

Because of the recent prohibition victory in Oregon, the people of the Garfield country, met at the Nora Memorial Church, last Sunday afternoon and held a general rejoicing.

Representative Guy T. Hunt spoke briefly and promised his full support of the enforcement of the laws regulating the liquor traffic and other vital problems.

The Clackamas County delegates, Hunt, Risley, Schugel and Dimick, will all be heard from in the coming session, in connection with wise legislation and enforcement of the prohibition laws.
