## THE CHILDREN'S FRIEND GONE

### Mrs. Boswell Dies Wednesday Afternoon

In the death of Mrs. B. O. Boswell of Estacada, last Wednesday afternoon, the people of this community, and especially the children, have lost a well beloved friend.

The end came peacefully, following a supposed improvement in her condition, but owing to her age, she was unable to withstand the complications which followed the original attack of pneumonia.

Her husband, B. O. Boswell; his sister, Mrs. Melton of Portland and the nurse, Miss Agnes Guthrie, were at the bedside at the last.

Mrs. Mattie E. Boswell was born in New York State in the year 1850 and was 65 years and 12 days old. On August 11th, 1881 in Topeka, Kansas she was married to B. O. Boswell and they came to Estacada in 1904, being among the early settlers of this city and have resided since at their pretty "Orchard Home."

Mrs. Boswell is survived by her husband, B. O. Boswell of Estacada, and five sisters and three brothers, residing in New York State.

The funeral arrangements are in charge of undertakers, Henthorn and Chapman of Estacada, who have prepared the body for interment next Sunday afternoon at Lone Oak Cemetery, following the funeral services at the Estacada M. E. Church at two o'clock.

Every man woman and child in Estacada and vicinity have suffered a loss in the passing of Mrs. Boswell. Her sweet disposition, her charming smile and utter unselfishness had endeared her to everyone. There is hardly a child within miles of Estacada who has not received some token of affection from her hands and never a holiday passed that she did not remember the little ones with postal cards and gifts. Her daintily prepared dishes and jellies have helped cheer more than one invalid and her co-operation in the works of the various societies and organizations will ever be missed.

The people of Estacada and the hundreds of friends nearby extend their sincerest sympathy to her husband and loved ones in this bereavement.

## Stockraisers Meet

A special meeting of the Oregon - Estacada Stockraisers Assn. was held last Wednesday afternoon at the Cary Mercantile Co's store. About twenty interested ranchers were present.

The object of the meeting was to confer with Supervisor Sherrard, who is in charge of the Reserve Range. Mr. Sherrard explained to the cattlemen, that it was to their advantage to organize, in order to obtain better and more concrete results in their dealings with his office, rather than each stockman attempting to deal separately. There is nothing compulsory about joining the association, and no attempt is being made to influence outsiders to join, although all are welcome to membership.

Mr. Sherrard stated that the main object of an association would be that its suggestions and rulings, if satisfactory to the Reserve officials, would govern the rulings for that part of the range and outsiders would be forced to abide by those rules.

Several new members were taken in at this meeting, making a total membership of about 18 to date, who are ranging about 170 head of cattle on the Reserve.
