Mrs. Sarah Jones at Rest

Mrs. Sarah Jones of Estacada, who had been ill for some time, passed away at 7 o'clock, Tuesday evening, Jan. 26th, at the home of her grandson Earl Jones.

Mrs. Jones was 73 years, 1 mo., and 10 days old and was born in Ohio in 1841. Her maiden name was Sarah J. Cook and with her parents moved to Monona county, Iowa in 1845, where in 1857 she married John Jones. In 1860 they crossed the plains to Colorado, where she lived until 1907, when she came to Oregon.

Her husband died in 1900. Of the ten children born to them, six are now living; J. T. and Aaron T. Jones and Mrs. Ada McKee of Colbran, Col.; Mrs. Ida Cook of Woodburn, Or.; Mrs. Eva Kiggins of Springwater, Or.; Mrs. Olive Johnson of Rosalia, Wash.; and a sister Mrs. Mary Miksh of Estacada.

The funeral services under the auspices of the Rebeccas, were held Thursday afternoon at two o'clock at the Christian church, Rev. Givens officiating. The burial was in charge of undertaker Henthorn, with interment at Lone Oak Cemetery.

CROWDS ATTEND FUNERAL Floral Tributes Magnificent

Over three hundred sorrowing friends from Estacada and surrounding country and many from Portland and other points, last Sunday afternoon, attended the funeral services of Mrs. B. O. Boswell of Estacada, who died at her home on January 20th.

The Estacada M. E. Church was taxed to its capacity, with many persons standing in the aisles, vestibule and porch and others remaining in the church yard.

The services at the church were simple and impressive and the funeral address delivered by Mr. A. Demoy was a beautiful tribute to her memory. It had been Mrs. Boswell's request that Mr. Demoy preach the funeral sermon and the tribute paid her memory and the lessons drawn from her unselfish, pure life, brought the tears to all eyes. S. E. Wooster sang four beautiful selections, that added to the impressiveness of the service.

The floral tributes were in keeping with the love and affection borne Mrs. Boswell. These included thousands of flowers in large and small clusters and many beautiful floral pieces, among which were gifts from the Estacada Civic Improvement Club, the Estacada merchants, the Estacada children, from Mr. Boswell's fellow employees of the P. R. L. & P. Co. and from individual friends.

After the services at the church, with Messrs. Wright, Bartlett, Simmons, Bartholomew, Devore and Jones, as pall-bearers, the casket was taken to the Lone Oak Cemetery, where interment followed, where the casket of pure white, was lowered into the flower strewn grave.
