Over \$1100. Paid Out

Last Monday's freight pulled out another carload of livestock from the Estacada yards, containing 65 hogs, 2 cows and 2 calves, which brought the raisers of the stock over \$1100.

The top price paid for these hogs was \$7.25 and that price to those who had agreed to sell about two weeks ago. The price at present is \$6.75 top.

Owing to the present high cost of wheat and feed, hundreds of swine raisers throughout the state last week sold a large number of their undersized hogs, rather than fatten them. This heavy dumping of pork into the Portland yards at once, amounting to over 7,000 in one day, naturally forced the price down, although it is not likely to remain down for very long.

Allowance must be made by the raisers for the condition of their hogs or cattle. The top price is paid for a first-class animal and drops of half a cent each, are paid for poorer stock. Cattle and swine, like any other articles are graded and this applies especially to beef cattle.

Where a grower has only a few hogs, it is not necessary for the buyer to see them before buying and owing to the expense of reaching some of the outlying farms, it is impossible to inspect them first. A large part of the present shipment was brought into the yards and purchased here, and no complaint has been made against the price paid in any case.

It is the old story though, as regards the consumer, while wheat is high, flour goes up more than enough to offset it, but with pork lower, no noticeable reduction in the retail price has been made.

Another shipment will be made probably two weeks from last Monday, or if the supply warrants, at an earlier date.
