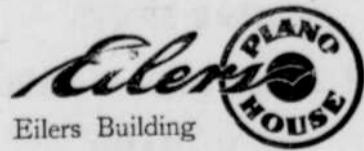

The Weekly Industrial Review states that the Brownsville Cannery last year, put up 31 tons of beans and several tons of pumpkin and their cash sales were \$26 577.00.

Now the Willamette Valley is coming to the front in the planting of sugar beets. Approximately 5,000 acres have been signed up in the past few days in the vicinity of Medford and Grants Pass, an acreage sufficient to warrant the erection of a beet sugar factory.

Eastern Clackamas County can raise nearly anything that will grow elsewhere in the state and it might be a wise move for some of the farmers to at least experiment with sugar beets, for the sound of the morning whistle from a sugar beet factory would sound just as cheerful as though it came from a cannery, and at present an occasional auto toot is our only sign of manufacturing supremacy.
