When To Cut Scions Concluded from page 4

The material with which to pack the bundles in storage may be almost any thing that is easily kept moist and that has no injurious qualities. Sphagnum moss, such as nurserymen use, the best of all Old sawdust that will not ferment is very good and is rather easily obtained. Leaf mold from the woods is good. Sand is very heavy to handle and necessitates washing the scions in order to get rid of grit.

To sum up, the most important points are as follows:

First-Good soll and good culture are essential, with plenty of light to produce young wood that is well stored with starchy matter and that has well developed buds Second.-Cut only the most vigorous
