### PROFIT IN CLEAN EGGS.

Fowls Should Be Provided With Fresh Nesting Material and Litter.

Poultry keepers may easily reduce the percentage of dirty or soiled eggs and losses entailed to insignificant figures, says Arthur C. Smith of the Minneapolis College of Agriculture. First an ample number of nests is, of course, necessary, but an ample number means no more than and probably not as many as are usually directed by poultry writers. Laying houses are, as a rule, provided with a sufficient number, but where the keeper falls down is in failing to supply enough nesting material and floor litter.

Obviously the nesting material must be clean or the eggs become soiled by contact and it must be sufficient in quantity or the eggs are often broken by dropping upon the hard floor of the nest. In houses where the dropping boards are above the nests and the custom is to sand the boards small stones often drop into the nest and breakage results when newly laid eggs fall upon them. The condition of nests should be noticed daily and the nesting material replenished when necessary. Plenty of nesting material prevents breakage and insures clean eggs.

An ample and clean floor after the floor is also very essential when an A1 clean product is sought. Particularly is this true when the hens are allowed outdoors during wet weather. The litter acts as a foot mat for the hens on their way to the nests.

Clean eggs bring better prices than dirty ones.



Bumblefoot results where fowls jump down from high perches to hard floors. The ball of foot swells, web puffs up between toes, abscess forms, foot gets hot and, if not treated at once, gangrene sets in. To cure, wash foot, draw sharp knife across ball of foot, cutting deep, and squeeze out pus and blood, then paint with iodine or carbolic acid and bandage, passing the rag across cut between toes, around shank and back again. Paint again if necessary. Place patient on straw away from roasts and foot will soon heal.

### Feed For a Fresh Cow.

After calving the first feed for a cow should be six or seven quarts of whole or preferably ground oats, which have been scalded with hot water half an hour before feeding and the pulp covered. These are stimulating and aid in getting her back to her normal condition. Some give warm mash consisting of a quart of oilmeal and corn or oilmeal and a little ground flax. It takes a cow about three weeks to reach her full flow of milk, depending largely upon the skill of the dairyman in bringing her to her full capacity. Special care should be exercised not to expose the cow to cold drafts at this critical period.

### The Profitable Cow.

It is a recognized fact among successful farmers and dairymen that cows, like persons, do their best only under the most favorable conditions. Well bred cows have a highly developed nervous system and are more sensitive even than human beings to good and bad treatment and to the effects of sanitary and insanitary surroundings. The contented cow produces a better grade of milk and more of it.
