Spraying to Begin Soon

All people wishing to have orchards or individual fruit trees sprayed, as per arrangement with the County Fruit Inspector, should notify W. R. Reid of Garfield, who will be in charge of the work. The machine would have commenced work in Estacada last Monday if the weather had been settled, but they are waiting until the trees are dryer, with a promise of a couple of days clear weather, after spraying.

Parties having but a few trees, need not buy the spray material, but can arrange with Mr. Reid to attend to the entire job, or he will do the work and the owner can furnish the material.

In many cases, owners of old orchards are cutting them down and utilizing the land for better purposes and others are cleaning the trees, preparatory to properly spraying.

Inspector Standish spent a few days last week in the vicinity of Mollala and Canby, inspecting orchards and nurseries.

Scales Being Installed
