MILK AND CREAM.

Cream should be at such a temperature that butter will come in twenty to thirty minutes.

The first requisite for clean milk is a clean cow.

The cream separator increases the value of the dairy products upon the farm.

Cows do not become great producers "just so." They must have the blood of good producers in them.

Are you sure that your common and unprofitable cows are being fed for the most profitable production? Perhaps it's your fault. Maybe you have good cows in your herd and you do not know it.

When a farmer makes and sells butter and feeds the skim milk to poultry, pigs and calves, he is not sending a great deal of his farm's fertility away. Keep the farm's fertility on the farm.

Cattle Bloat Treatment.

Bloat comes from the excessive formation of gas in the rumen, says Professor C. H. Eckles of the College of Agriculture, University of Missouri. It often results from pasturing on clover, but may occur with any kind of feeding. It is made known by the excessive

swelling of the left flank. If relief is not obtained in time the animal dies from suffocation due to the great pressure on the lungs.

In mild cases, driving the animal at a rapid gait for some distance may be sufficient. Cold water thrown in quantities upon the cow's sides may reduce the pressure. In very severe cases the gas must be removed without delay. This is best done by the use of a trocar. In using this instrument a spot is selected equally distant from the last rib, the hip bone and the backbone on the left side.

POULTRY WISDOM.

All the poultry houses should be in shape for winter.

Be sure there is a good supply of litter in every house. The birds need exercise and plenty of it.

Don't wait till the houses are infested with vermin. Keep spraying with some good lice killer and keep the houses clean all the time.

It is well to be preparing at this time for a supply of green feed for your flock during the winter. Beets make a good winter ration, as do turnips or small potatoes. Immature heads of cabbage are an excellent winter feed.

Do not crowd your birds into a space too small for them. Keep only as many as can be comfortably housed.

Distemper in Horses

Distemper in a horse will run a full course and cannot be stopped by the use of medicine. Any symptoms which appear should be treated according to their severity. The use of proper grain feeds and a course of tonics is about all that is necessary in mild cases. If abscesses appear in the region of the throat these, of course, should be opened, well drained and the cavities flushed with an antiseptic solution. As a treatment for intestinal worms give a pint of raw linseed oil to which has been added one ounce of turpentine, the same to be given for three consecutive days. Following this give a tablespoonful twice daily of a mixture of equal parts of salt, powdered iron sulphate and sulphur for ten days.
