TREATMENT FOR BLOAT IN CATTLE

Bloat in cattle is a common ailment likely to occur in the spring and early summer. Thousands of cows and calves are lost every year because of lack of immediate treatment, writes E. T. Baker in the Country Gentleman.

A cow has four stomachs. The first one, commonly known as the paunch, contains nearly thirty-five gallons. This mass of stomach contents ferments rapidly and soon paralyzes the passageway from the paunch to the gullet. This prevents the animal from belching up the gas, and unless relief is given within a few minutes death ensues from general paralysis and suffocation.

All sorts of devices are used to cause the animal to belch.

What should be done should be done at once. There is no time to wait for a veterinarian. The cattle owner should be prepared for this emergency above all things. Some men will merely jab the blade of a pocketknife into the distended flank, but that causes a filthy sore that takes months to heal. For a dollar or so one may obtain a "cattle trocar."

In tapping a bloated cow step to the left side of the animal, place the trocar about midway between the last rib and the point of the hip, being careful not to choose a position too high. Pointing the instrument in the general direction of the right shoulder, with one vigorous blow of the hand or a small board drive the trocar in to the tilt. Do not be afraid it will go in too far. Remember the instrument enters the first stomach, which is larger in diameter than a wash tub. Pull out the stylet, leaving the cannula, through which the gas escapes, in place. In a few minutes the animal shows great relief. Allow the cannula to remain in place for an hour or so and if it becomes stopped up with a piece of grass dislodge the obstruction with the stylet. After an hour pull out the cannula with a quick movement and smear a little tar or tincture of iodine over the point of tapping. The next day you will have a hard time to discover the location of the puncture.

After tapping to prevent further fermentation one can give a pound of common baking soda with several heaping tablespoonfuls of ground ginger. Don't be afraid to use a large quantity of medicine for cattle. If the animal is very weak four tablespoonfuls of aromatic spirits of ammonia given in a little water will prove to be a better stimulant than whisky and will sometimes tide an animal over after it seems nearly dead. But the trocar used promptly will prove a life saver.
