Judge Campbell Acts Wisely

Matt Jagmin of Elwood, who was indicted on a charge of burglary by the grand jury, entered a plea of guilty in the circuit court last week.

Judge Campbell sentenced him to a term of from two to five years and then paroled him on the condition that he pay the costs of the case, amounting to \$33.45; that he refrain from taking a drink of liquor for the next five years and that he report to the sheriff once each thirty days.

The above is a wise and lenient decision on the part of Judge Campbell and is in keeping with the highest type of judicial wisdom; for Jagmin, while guilty of burglary is not and never was a criminal, but merely a farmer boy who went wrong temporarily. A sentence to the penitentiary, if served by Jagmin would have brought him in contact with real criminals and would undoubtedly have ended by his becoming one himself, with its attendant hatred of the laws of society. As it is, Jagmin will return home and cannot help but be a better and wiser man, thanks to the generosity and faith of Judge Campbell.

Any and all tax-payers* who have suggestions, good advice or good wishes to offer these officials, are invited to be present.

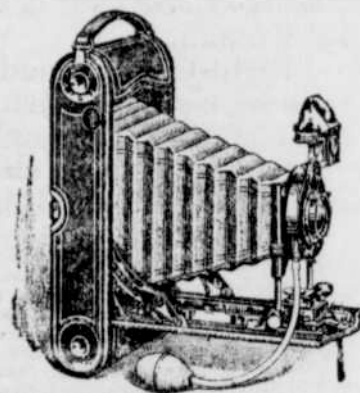
