Blue Book Ready

Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott has the Oregon Blue Book ready for distribution. This year's, while no larger, contains many added and valuable features. It gives a history of Oregon; the State Constitution, with amendments; list of state and county officers; description of state boards, commissions, and institutions, with names of members and officers; an outline of duties of county officers; list and duties of federal officers having jurisdiction in Oregon; information about the state flag, state seal, state flower, legal holidays, legal interest rates and qualifications for voters; an abstract of votes on President, Senators, Congressmen and state officers; abstract of votes on all initiative and referendum measures submitted to the state; list of state appropriations; lists of former state officers; lists of Oregon newspapers, postoffices, banks and libraries.

Every year the Blue Book is improving, and this issue keeps it at the head of all similar publications by state governments, for it is concise, handy, well-written—contains a greater variety of information in more readable and accessible form; in fact, it reflects the efficiency of Secretary Olcott's office, which is saying a great deal.

Who Pays the Taxes

In round numbers, the assessed valuation upon which taxes are levied in Oregon is on the following general classes of property:

| Agriculture, including farm lands, improvements, live stock, etc... | 26% |

Stated another way, Agriculture pays on one-fourth the taxable property, lumber on about one-fifth, city and town property on about two-fifths, and railroads and public utility companies on about one-eighth.

No data is available to show the exact figures this year as between timber lands, and farm lands, but under a new ruling of the State Tax Bureau the assessors will be required to separate timber lands from farm lands hereafter. The segregation above, while based on the State Bureau's figures, also takes into account the best available data as to the acreage and value of privately-owned timber lands in each county.

FEEDING YOUNG PIGS.

March Litters Should Be Ready to Market in October.

The cheapest feeds for raising and fattening hogs in Ohio are corn and clover or alfalfa, writes an Ohio farmer in the National Stockman. December is too late to market early spring pigs. By that time the market is glutted. My method is to keep enough old corn to fatten my February and March pigs by Oct. 15, by which time they should weigh 250 pounds. January is too early for spring pigs. Pigs will begin to eat grass at six weeks of age. To have them farrowed not later than March 15 is early enough. The weather is much more favorable, and the pigs are not so apt to become stunted.

I feed my sows light just before farrowing and very light for two or three days following so as to avoid milk fever. I aim to have the sow on full feed in a couple of weeks after farrowing if she is suckling a full litter, less



The Duroc-Jersey hog is of the hard type and is noted for its size, hardness and ability to lay on flesh. It is said of this hog that it will put on more pounds for equal amount of feed than any other breed. They are good grazers and rustlers and are noted for vigor and freedom from disease. They are excellent breeders and the sows are careful mothers. The Duroc-Jersey is more prolific than the other hard types of hogs. The picture shows a pure bred Duroc-Jersey boar.

In proportion to the number of pigs, I feed about five pounds of shorts, one pound 60 per cent tankage per day and all the corn they will eat twice a day. I have had pigs weigh seventy pounds at nine weeks old when they were weaned. If the sows are on grass they do not need the tankage.

As soon as the pigs begin to eat there should be shelled corn and shorts placed in a shallow trough where the pigs have free access to it. I feed my shorts all the corn they will eat. In the winter I mix two parts shorts and one part tankage and feed one pound per day to about fifty pounds of live weight. When they are on grass I feed nothing but corn after they weigh 100 pounds. I prefer to feed my shorts dry. In real cold weather if the slop is not warmed the pigs will gas and choke, whereas if feed is dry there is none of that, and my hogs drink cold water freely. I feed and water in a closed building. March 1 and Aug. 1 are good times for sows to farrow. My sows are always fat and so come in heat while suckling. I breed for August farrowing when the pigs are from four to six weeks old. All hogs are fitted for market here on corn.
