Mr. and Mrs. Henry Beers and Miss Echo Githens of Alspaugh, visited friends in Gresham last Sunday.

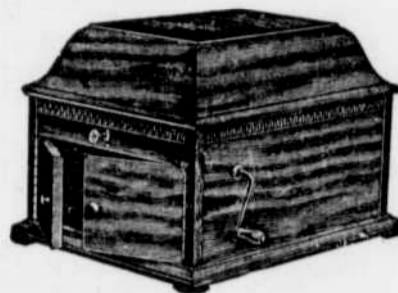
Tobacco and Cigarettes will be the subject of Rev. Kady's lecture at the Viola church next Sunday evening.
