ment into the yards and familiarize themselves with the process of selling and other details.

Market report of the Portland Union Stock Yards Co., North Portland, Oregon, Monday, Sept. 20, 1915. Receipts for Monday are cattle 1233; calves 25; hogs 2606; sheep 465.

Cattle market opened up this morning with a run of 1200 head. Prices ruled around the 6.90 mark for choice steers, 5.00 for best cows, bulls at 4.00 and stags went as high as 6.65. The stock went fast with bulk ranging from 6.00 to 6.50; outlook fair.

With a fair run of 2600 hogs, trading in the swine division was not very brisk, owing, probably, to lack of quality. One load of good hogs brought 6.75, 10c over last week's close. The bulk sold at 6.50 to 6.65.

Sheep transactions were made rapidly with an advance of 25c on yearlings. Lambs are grabbed up quickly at 7.00, ewes at 5.00 and wethers 5.50.

The packers can easily handle many more sheep than have been coming in; receipts for today totaled to about 425 head.
