Miss Edna Kennedy was the guest of Mrs. Metzger of Gresham, over Saturday night.

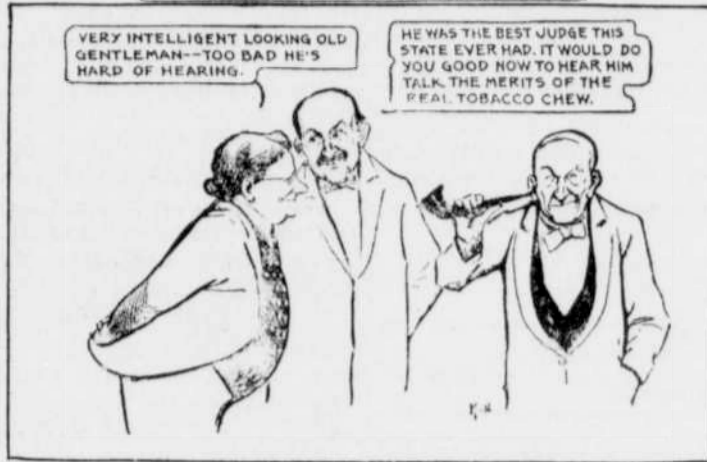
