Three Districts Dropped

In line with County Judge Anderson's theory that all road districts should have roads leading to marketing points and his belief that Clackamas county has too many districts, the county court Thursday cut the number of districts from 60 to 57, and minor revisions were made in several other districts. The changes were made on the last day of September, the last allowed under the new state law. The districts discontinued are 59, 60 and 20.

District 60 is south of Molalla and was divided between districts 22 and 28.

District 20 is in the Clarks neighborhood and was divided between 45, 21 and 19. District 59 was absorbed by district 14.

Judge Anderson, who has made a careful study of road districts, believes that the changes made this year are the beginning of a more logical and satisfactory division of the county. He is of the opinion, however, that it will require several years to put his ideas into practice completely.
