CAUSE AND REMEDY FOR FOAMY CREAM

The foamy cream trouble is one very common during the winter months when cows are receiving dry feed and are far along in the milking period, states C. H. Eckles of the Missouri experiment station. The trouble comes about from the fact that the fat in the butter is hard at this time of year, caused by the dry feed, and that the milk contains so much curd. Sometimes such cream cannot be churned under any conditions. No particular kind of feed is responsible for the trouble nor can it be remedied by making any change in the ration unless it is by giving the cows a succulent feed like silage and linseed meal.

The first thing to do is to make sure the temperature of the cream is not too low. Very often when no thermometer is used the cream is put into the churn altogether too cold, and the churning continues until the temperature is raised by friction of the churn to such a point that the butter can gather. Foaming of the cream usually means that the cream is thin and cold. A thermometer of some kind should be used and the temperature of the cream brought to 64 or 65 degrees before churning where this trouble has occurred.

If a cream separator is at hand the difficulty of churning can be largely removed by taking the sweet cream as soon as it is separated, mixing it with as much warm water as there was milk to start with and reseparatoring it. The butter from such cream will taste slightly flat, but will remove enough of the curd so the churning will usually take place in a fairly satisfactory manner. If no separator is used the same thing can be accomplished by mixing the cream while sweet with warm water and allowing it to stand in a pan until the cream can rise to the surface, when it is skimmed off.

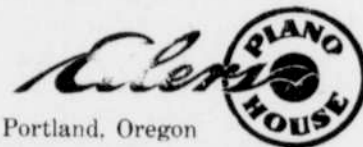

Road Work Progressing

With the rock crusher stationed in the grove between Nicholson's and Mrs. Stubbe's, the Garfield road crew from District 10, in charge of Supervisor Duncan, is doing some good work these days.

They have already placed a new top dressing of crushed rock on the lower part of the Wilson Hill, widening the roadway. A culvert has been placed in the creek where it crosses the road near the Yocum barn, bringing the road up to grade with crushed rock filling. Similar redressing of worn spots and better drainage will be done this fall, leaving nearly all of the Garfield roads in fine condition for the winter travel. The road leading from Trapp's corner south as far as the Wonacott place has been well paved with crushed rock and with some additional rolling will be in good shape.

The taxpayers of District 10 do not favor the spending of the \$540. appropriated for the continuation of the George Road through their district, for plank, preferring to wait until enough money is available to rock and permanently build the roadway.

It is likely that a number of George, Garfield and Estacada taxpayers will go to Oregon City to attend the next meeting of the county court, to further impress upon the court the necessity of appropriating enough money from the general fund to finish the George road before the winter rains set in, as it will be impassable otherwise.
