Salem, Ore., Oct. 22.—The Portland Railway Light & Power Company had a deficit of \$8417.22 as a result of operations during the year ending June 30, according to the annual report filed late yesterday with the state public service commission.

With its annual report to the commission, the corporation filed a copy of its report to the stockholders for the year ending December 31, 1914. This report gave as reasons for the unsatisfactory financial showing competition of the Northwestern Electric Company, competition of jitney automobiles and motor busses, and a continuation of quiet business conditions.

Budget of the City of Estacada, Clackamas County, Oregon, for the year 1915

Notice is hereby given that pursuant to Section 21, Clause 3 of the City Charter of the City of Estacada, Chapter 234, General Laws of the State of Oregon, and Chapter 222, General Laws of the State of Oregon, the Common Council of the City of Estacada, Clackamas County, Oregon, will at a regular meeting held in the City Hall said City, at the hour of 8 o'clock P. M. on November 10, 1915, by ordinance levy a tax of five mills, on the property in the City of Estacada, Clackamas County, Oregon, to raise the sum needed, as set out below.

Sum of money needed (estimated on expenditures for year Oct. 13, 1914 to Oct. 14, 1915) \$1124.68

The above estimate is arrived at as follows: - Rent of City Pound, \$18. Special Police at Sunday Picnics, Fourth of July Celebrations, and other special occasions, (estimated) \$70. City Health Officer, \$10. Salary of Recorder, \$180. Salary of City Treasurer, 1% of money checked out of General Fund, (estimated) \$10. City Lights, at \$18. per month, \$216. Interest on Sewer and Road Bonds, \$300. Supplies necessary for registering voters, (estimated) \$50. Registering voters, (estimated at 200 registrations,) \$20. Miscellaneous expenditures, stationery, printing, stamps, general labor, care of animals impounded and not claimed or taken out, etc. \$253.17

Sources of revenue, other than from direct taxation on real and personal property, for the year 1916. Licenses. Pool hall, \$20. Peddlers, (estimated) \$12. Dog, (estimated) \$18. Fines, (estimated) \$50. Total, \$100. Amount of balance on hand October 20, 1915, None.

There is at this date, October 20, 1915, outstanding warrants to the amount of, \$67.87

Estimated valuation of real and personal property, in the corporate limits of the City of Estacada, \$196,131.10

Amount to be raised by tax, \$1024.68

Amount of tax allowed by City Charter of the City of Estacada, \$.005

Amount that a levy of \$.005 will raise, \$980.65

The above budget is for general running expenses of the City only, any money needed for street improvements and maintenance, must come from another and separate tax. The above tax has heretofore been levied by the City Council by passage of ordinance. The above estimate shows that it is imperative that the full \$.005 levy must be made, for even with this levy there will be a deficit in the year 1916.
