Church Remodling Underway

When the present additions and alterations now underway in the basement of the Estacada M. E. Church are completed, it will make that building one of the most complete, convenient and up-to-date church structures in the county.

All members of the congregation, Sunday School classes and societies are doing their share to help finance and complete the labor on the work. The various Sunday School classes having pledged from \$5. to \$25. each as their share, with the Ladies' Aid Society guaranteeing \$100.

The work is in charge of a building committee, headed by Pastor Spiess, assisted by Owen Smith and A. J. Mills. The carpentry work is in charge of J. P. Woodlee, with a large part of the actual labor being done by the men and boys of the church. It is estimated that the improvements will cost about \$350. to \$375.

The basement is now ready for the cement flooring, and when finished the space will be divided into a large kitchen, with dining room 13x27 feet adjoining, three class rooms, hallways, toilets, furnace and fuel rooms, with main stairway leading down from the auditorium. The walls will be plastered and the rooms made as comfortable and homelike as possible.

Preaching services will be held at the church next Sunday evening, to which everyone is invited.
