THANKSGIVING RECIPES

MISS McQUAID

NEW ENGLAND THANKSGIVING PUDDING:—Roll common crackers, making 1 1/2 cupsful. Put in bowl, pour over them 4 cupsful of scalded milk and let stand to cool. Then add lump of sugar, 4 eggs slightly beaten, 1/3 cup melted butter, 1 teaspoon salt and half a grated nutmeg.

Cook 1 1/2 cups of raisins in boiling water, just to cover, until plump, cool and seed. Add to first mixture, turn into buttered deep bread pan. Set pan in larger pan containing boiling water and bake in slow oven 3 hours. Stir after first half hour of cooking to prevent raisins from settling. When done, serve with lemon and hard-sauce.

HARD-SAUCE:—1/3 cup butter, 1 cup powdered sugar, 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla—cream butter extremely well and add sugar gradually and flavoring. Hard-sauce

is also used in serving hot apple dumplings:—2 cups of flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon of salt, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/4 cup of milk, 4 apples cut in eighths, mix and sift dry ingredients, work in butter with tips of fingers, add milk gradually, mixing with a knife, toss on floured board, pat and roll out, place apple on middle of piece of dough and sprinkle with 1/4 teaspoon salt and nutmeg, bring dough around and carefully lift into buttered mold or five pound lard pail, cover closely and steam 1 hour and 20 minutes. In serving, place hard-sauce at side of serving dish, that it may be added a little at a time.

To Visit Columbia Highway
