A DAIRY FARMING PAPER

A few Don'ts for the Producers of Milk:

Don't neglect to see that you have healthy cows to begin with. If a cow is not healthy she is most likely to produce unwholesome milk.

Don't tolerate a barn without at least, concrete gutters. To be sanitary, a barn must be well lighted, ventilated, and have smooth walls. The barn equipment should have as little surface as possible for dust to settle on.

Don't have a muddy barnyard. In Western Oregon, a barnyard must be well drained and have some sort of a roof for protection.

Don't milk dirty cows. Cows should be curried at least once a day. Their sides and udders should be washed a few minutes before milking so the dust and hairs will not fall into the milk.

Don't wear the dirtiest farm clothes for milking. Milkers should wear clean garments (preferably white.)

Don't use milk vessels with open seams. All milk utensils should be rinsed and thoroughly scalded after using, and sunned as often as possible. Use a brush for washing the utensils.

Don't feed sour or musty feeds.

Don't neglect to provide plenty of pure water. The cows will not go far for water more than once a day, and they should have pure water, and plenty of it, in order to produce a maximum flow of milk.

Don't allow the bedding to become dirty. Short straw makes the best bedding. Sawdust or planer shavings do not seem to be beneficial to the land when used in manure, so their use should be avoided when possible.

Don't wet your hands with milk while milking. This habit is filthy and inexcusable. Every drop of milk that falls into the pail from the hands carries thousands of bacteria.

Don't use the first stream of milk from each teat if you wish pure milk. The first stream is the poorest and contains many bacteria.

Don't allow flies to worry your cows. Flies also carry a great many bacteria.
