Rural Carrier Examination

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the County of Clackamas, Oregon, to be held at Oregon City, on February 5, 1916, at 9 A. M., to fill the position of rural carrier at Molalla and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other postoffices in the above-mentioned county. The examination will be open only to male citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977. This form and application blanks may be obtained from the offices mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington at the earliest practical date.

Register Now

All voters, who contemplate voting at the coming primary and regular elections, are requested to register early, as unnecessary confusion results from everyone trying to register the last few days before the registration books close.

Attorney Devore, official register for Estacada districts 1 and 2, George and Garfield, states that all former registrations are void and voters will have to register again this year in order to vote. This registration according to the new law, will act as a permanent registry providing voters vote at each general election, or excepting in case a voter changes residence.

Suprising Figures

According to the government's crop report, Oregon, where it used to be said corn could not be grown, stands second in the list of corn growing states for yield per acre, with 35 bushels; Illinois leading with 36 bushels and Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas showing yields of 30, 30 and 31 bushels respectively.

Oregon, with a yield value of \$28.70 per acre, leads the others; Illinois value being \$19.44 with the others less.

Of course, Oregon's acreage of corn is very small as compared with the middle western states, but it is good news to find that we are well in line to become a corn growing state.

The Oregon Voter, from which these figures were obtained, gives much credit for this condition to the O. W. R. & N. and Great Northern Rys., the O. A. C., and several eastern Oregon counties. To this list should be added Clackamas County, with the P. R. L. & P. Co., among the railways that have helped to stimulate the growing of this product.
