Community Church Favored

Estacada, Or. Jan. 31, 1916
Editor - Progress.

Dear Sir: In response to your request for a statement regarding the Community Church project, I would say that in my judgement a Union Church in Estacada, combining the religious forces of the village, would be an ideal arrangement, provided it could be organized on a platform sufficiently broad to admit the varying shades of religious belief, without at the same time undermining the fundamental object of the church's existence, viz the promotion of a vital personal, transforming religion.

As to whether such a church could also serve the the country points, I confess to serious doubts. A community center is one of the greatest needs of the country neighborhood. A permanent agency that will organize the now almost wholly organized life of the country along religious, social and intellectual lines, is also a crying need of country life.

Regardless of whether or not the country church has met this situation in the past, it is the natural center and organizing agency for this work.

We might with profit all come together to the community church in Estacada for public worship, but in my judgement the country center would have to be maintained as a substation, if the church is really to serve the entire field.

FALL FRESHENING COWS PAY BEST

Unless you have a special all the year around trade three-fourths of the cows should come fresh from August to November, writes L. W. Lighty in the National Stockman. And even with such a trade it is often good business to have most of the cows come fresh in the autumn. During the summer a number of my best butter customers would spend most of their time at the seashore or in the mountains, and the demand for butter fell off nearly a third.

In the winter they were all at home and consumed a maximum quantity. With a few exceptions, we can make the most money by having most of our cows coming fresh in the fall of the year. Why is this not generally practiced? Because the majority of us prefer to allow things in general to drift rather than make them come our way. We pay little or no attention to this matter and soon the herd will be following the natural unselected and freshen in the spring.

But we must always have absolute control of our business if it is to be a source of pleasure and profit. By intelligent management we can, in the course of a few years, so breed our animals as to have a major portion of them come fresh when the most profit can be made.

There is a number of factors that must be considered. The breeder who has his business well in hand knows each individual animal and knows how to handle her to the best advantage. He always makes calculations for the future when breeding the heifers the first and second time, and very often careful and intelligent management here determines the future profit in a great measure.

The dairyman who would make a profit cannot afford to allow any part of his business to go a drifting. As much of the feed as is economical should be grown on the farm. The ration must be ample and economical. The breeding and handling of the young stock require skill and the most careful attention.
