E. W. Bartlett of Estacada last week announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for the office of county district attorney.

To date, Wm. M. Stone of Oregon City is the only other candidate in the field for this nomination. Gilbert Hedges, the present incumbent will probably be the contender on the Democratic ticket.

While no announcement has been made, it is rumored that F. J. Harkenrider of Estacada is being boosted as a candidate for county commissioner, making about a half dozen good men from this part of the county who are now being considered for this important office, the others being J. W. Reed of Estacada, John Ely of Currinsville, Chas. Duncan and Guy Hunt of Garfield, John C. Miller of Barton, and others.
