vertised to take place last Sunday afternoon at the M. E. Church, at which time Dr. Ford, superintendent of the Salem District would confer with the local people, as to the advisability of the formation of the community church.

The greatest drawback to the success of the meeting, lay in the fact that aside from members of the Methodist Church, almost no other people were present, excepting leaders from the branch M. E. Churches from Garfield, Zion and Currinsville.

Under these conditions, little informal discussion took place, the meeting finally resolving itself into a presentation by Dr. Ford of the attitude of the Methodist Church towards community organization, but the gist of his remarks left the impression that the M. E. Church was more willing to absorb than to melt its identity into the community church.

Yet, allowances must be made for the fact, that to date, through Pastor Spiess and Dr. Ford, all of the actual advances that have been made in the matter of consolidation, have been from the M. E. Church, and, as conditions stand now, they could not be expected to offer complete surrender of their property and rights, until some tangible concrete body has been formed, worthy to take over the M. E. properties, without doing harm.

A step of this sort cannot be handled in a few days and efforts are now under way among a number of community church enthusiasts to bring about another, less secular and more informal meeting, announcement of which will be made later.
