Fish Eating Cattle.

The use of fish as food for cattle is an idea more novel than agreeable. According to Nature, however, it is a common practice in various parts of the world. In Shetland and Iceland the farmers feed dry salt fish to cuttle, sheep and even to horses. Cecil Wood, describing experiments of this nature, mentious that certain special cattle, kept for display at the village festivals in Nandyal, in India, are fed with mutton and adds that it is a fairly common practice to make use of bandicoots by pounding them in a mortar and feeding them to cattle. In Mr. Wood's experiments two lots of beifers were fed on dried fish diet and

normal diet respectively.

The animals took a little time to get used to the fish, but they ate it readily enough. At the end of six months the fish fed heifers showed an average increase in weight of fifty-four pounds as against seventy pounds for the normally fed animals.
