Viola Breezes

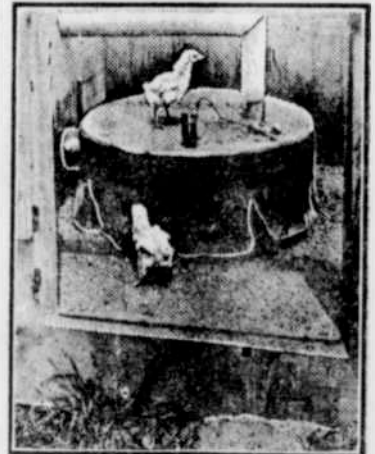

The hover here pictured is twenty-two inches in diameter, ten inches high and is all clear space beneath. The heat is overhead and radiates down as in nature. It enters from a lamp box outside, circulates through a radiator on top of the hover and all lamp fumes are returned outside, so that this element, so deadly to chicks, is entirely absent. The hover ventilator is on top in the center, and with a regulator attached an even temperature is preserved.
