TAXPAYERS MEET

AT SPRINGWATER

June Meeting At Estacada 24th

In a drizzling rain, about a score of men attended the May 22nd meeting of the Eastern Clackamas Taxpayers' League at the Springwater Grange Hall, the gathering included a number of loyal taxpayers from Barton, who had made the long trip.

As is the case in all poorly attended meetings, little enthusiasm could be engendered, notwithstanding the especially interesting talks, given by local and visiting speakers.

R. C. Deming, promotor of the new Estacada cannery, briefly outlined the contemplated work of that industry, explaining the kind of small fruits wanted by the cannery and paying special attention to the maintaining of the highest grade of fruit only. A few questions were asked the speaker, relating to the packing and shipping of prunes from the plant, later in the season.

District Attorney Gilbert C. Hedges of Oregon City, who had not been expected to be able to appear on the program at this time, arrived soon after the opening of the meeting, having motored over from the county seat, despite the bad roads via the Viola route. Mr. Hedges gave a rousing good talk, substantially defending the past and future actions of his office, explaining in detail the workings of the prohibition enforcement department and showing that the \$3,000, appropriated to enforce the prohibition laws, rather than being consumed, was being increased by added fines, with about \$3500. on hand now and much more in sight.

Had it been known that Mr. Hedges would appear on the program, undoubtedly a much larger assembly of taxpayers would have braved the disagreeable weather and attended the meeting.

The principal speaker was Mr. C. L. Starr of Portland. Mr. Starr is a well known attorney, specializing on tax law and was for some time connected with the State Tax Commission and at present representing a clientele of large timber owning companies, whose interest he is protecting in all matters pertaining to tax matters.

Mr. Starr was a forceful speaker and enthusiastic on his pet subject of taxes, tax levying and tax collection. He urged the taxpayers to take a greater interest in tax matters, asking that they personally attend the meetings of all annual tax levying bodies and personally look after their own affairs and not wait until too late and then find fault with their assessed valuation or rate of assessment. Briefly the speaker outlined the advantages to be gained by the creation of the unit system in school districts, with the elimination of the present school district boundaries.

The June meeting will occur at Estacada, Saturday afternoon, June 24th.
