the meeting adjourned.

### Patton's Friends Loyal

A monstrous petition is now  
going the rounds of this part of  
the county, asking the Commis-  
sion to keep Mr. Patton in the  
office. A similar petition is being  
circulated at Molalla and one at  
Sandy, as his friends there are  
just as indignant over the report-  
ed appointment of a successor, as  
those in Estacada.

In speaking of Mr. Patton's  
friend's, it does not mean a lim-  
ited clientele of close acquaint-  
ances, but includes hundreds of  
people, who only know him for  
his work in game protection and  
kindred pursuits.

Many parties have written per-  
sonal letters to the state's exe-  
cutive, with the ladies of the Es-  
tacada Civic Improvement Club  
joining in the remonstrance.

Mr. Patton, during the five  
years service locally has proved  
to be more than a mere game  
warden, but has embodied in the  
work a large amount of educa-  
tional method. He has person-  
ally donated to the Estacada li-  
brary standard books on bird and  
animal life, has gathered local  
county statistics and is a constant  
contributor of instructive articles  
for several magazines, among  
them being the Oregon Sports-  
man.

Mr. Patton has done more for  
the propagation and protection  
of game and fish in this commu-  
nity, than all other interests com-  
bined. He has labored for hours  
in the disagreeable work of fish  
liberation, has spent many cold  
days and nights during the past  
cold winter in providing food for  
the game and song birds, has been  
a prime mover in the establish-  
ment and conduct of the Estaca-  
da Rod & Gun Club and also en-  
forced the laws regulating game  
protection.

Mr. Patton has investigated  
and secured the conviction of  
many offenders; has substantially  
driven out all illegal deer hunters  
and in many cases has turned in-  
to clean, law abiding sportsmen,  
men and boys who formerly did  
not believe in game protection.

It is hoped that the rumored  
appointment of a successor to Mr.  
Patton is a mistake, but whether  
correct or not, the Governor of  
Oregon and the members of the  
State Fish & Game Commission  
will know the esteem in which  
County Warden Ben S. Patton is  
held by the taxpayers and resi-  
dents of the agricultural and  
mountain sections of this county.
