Probably few readers of the various Clackamas County papers would ever suspect that the editors of the various news mediums, are pretty friendly and occasionally get together and enjoy a square meal at mutual expense.

The addition of W. E. Brainerd, succeeding G. E. Brookings as editor of the Canby Herald; and of C. W. Robey, taking over the responsibilities of the Oregon City Courier, in place of E. R. Brown and with the advent of editor Jones at Oswego, it is time the Clackamas County publishers get together once more and get acquainted.

It used to be laughable to see editors Brown and Brodie of the pulpy city's rival newspapers, hobnobbing together over the demi-tasse and lighting cigarettes from the same match, the next day to be back at their desks throwing verbal bombs at each other.

During one of these get-together-meals, even editor Taylor of Molalla forgets that he once was a preacher and acts like an ordinary well mannered editor and in the meantime, the News' editor sits by in silence, absorbing wisdom from the remarks and actions of the old guard publishers.

The News herewith wishes to compliment and congratulate the Clackamas County officers, Gilbert C. Hedges, District Attorney and W. J. Wilson, Sheriff, for the good work done in the final conviction and sentencing of Fritz Boysen of Milwaukie, for violations of the prohibition law.

Boysen was convicted in the Justice Court several weeks ago and sentenced to serve six months in the penitentiary and pay a \$500. fine, but expected to be able to escape the penitentiary term and get off with his usual fine, by appealing the case.

In the appeal, which came up last week before Judge Campbell in the Circuit Court, the sentence of the Justice Court was upheld.

Boysen has been given time to file a bill of exceptions and prepare a motion for a new trial and placed under \$2,000. bail, but it looks as though his efforts this time to escape the jail sentence would be futile.

In passing sentence on the proprietor of the notorious Hotel Belle, Judge Campbell did not mince words in denouncing the proprietor and his place of business, and coupled with the scoring of the District Attorney, it should be some time before Boysen attempts to peddle booze again.

This postal regulation is being enforced by the postal authorities, consequently all subscriptions which are not paid in advance by July 1st next, will be stopped and the subscribers should not feel that it is a personal injustice.

The News has between five and six hundred subscribers and does not wish to lose a single one, owing to this postal regulation.

The \$1. subscription price now current, or the \$1.50 price, which will take effect August 1st, is low enough to allow of all residents affording to take the home newspaper and as to whether the News is worth the small amount charged, is a question for each subscriber to answer.
