**To Prevent Forest Fires, Cour.'s Aim**

Aiming to prevent the big forest fires of former years, the Clackamas county court will send to every road supervisor in a timbered district instructions to clean up his roads, remove rubbish and clean out dry underbrush.

J. W. Ferguson, of Estacada, district fire warden, appeared before the county court last week, recommending this act. Letters will be sent the road supervisors at once.

A large part of the taxable property in Clackamas county consists of timber, so that the county in instructing its supervisors to clean up roads to prevent forest fires is working in its own interests.
