Oregon City, is merely a part of the main road leading to the county seat.

This Milwaukie-Sellwood road is the one, which it will be remembered by the taxpayers, cost Clackamas County \$12,000, two years ago, to pave with a bituminous material, which proved a miserable and expensive failure, now necessitating about \$7,626.45 per mile more to repave.

Editor Brodie contends the Milwaukie-Sellwood Road is no luxury for the taxpayers, but there are some who might disagree with him and his economic standards.

At the time that the above mentioned bituminous paving was placed on the Milwaukie-Sellwood Road, it was also heralded as an everlasting pavement, so what reason have we, the taxpayers of the county, to feel confident that the present type of asphaltic concrete pavement, now being laid, will be other than another expensive experiment at our expense?

The Enterprise may be correct in its statement that other sections of the county, such as Molalla, Canby, Macksburg, Wilsonville, Oswego, Sandy etc, are not complaining, but that is their inalienable right and just because they have not uttered a word of protest against the project, is no reason why the taxpayers of this part of the county, should not be advised of the present luxurious work underway.

If the county newspapers do not keep the taxpayers informed on these subjects, who will? The county court today does not expend any large amount of money keeping the people posted on the actions of its department, excepting such legal advertising of reports as is necessary to be advertised in the county seat papers, and which are seen by a small proportion of the taxpayers in this part of Clackamas County.

The News has no bone to pick with the members of the county court, as they are undoubtedly doing their best, allowing for the environment in which they are placed, coupled with the ever exerting and often misleading influence of the county seat commercial organizations. Furthermore, neither the News nor its editor are looking for favors from the county court or any individuals, if it means the muzzling of the facts and catering to the officers to obtain them.

The News hopes to hear further from brother Brodie, as it is also possible that some or his subscribers might enjoy the discussion of some of these pertinent matters.

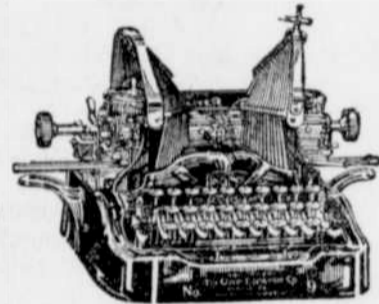
