WE'VE GONE BACK TO THE DOLLAR PRICE.—Sometime ago, the News announced that after August 1st, the subscription price would be advanced to \$1.50 per year, payable as usual in advance.

This advance was necessary, owing to the steadily increasing prices of materials going into the make-up of the paper.

Materials still remain high priced but we believe they will soon regain their normal basis and as many people feel they cannot afford one dollar and a half for a weekly newspaper, consequently the **SUBSCRIPTION PRICE** from now on, will be \$1.

The issuance of a newspaper of the class of the News, means a primal outlay of considerable more than the subscription price asked, but this loss will be taken up in some other way by the publisher.

In the case of subscribers who have paid the \$1.50 price, we will gladly refund the extra 50c or will extend the subscriptions six months.

The News now goes into nearly every home in this part of the county and is read by over 2,500 people per week. If the return to the dollar subscription basis will result in its continued growth and influence in the community, the extra 50c will not stand in the way.

Have you ever considered the condition which would exist in this community or any other, if there was no local newspaper?

The news items of interest would not only be unknown, except as passed on from mouth to mouth, but there would be no medium for the announcement of entertainments, meetings, and matters of vital importance.

This remark was apropos of the News' late complaints against the county's hardsurfacing mania, so long as the Boring Hill Road remains in its present unpassable condition.
