County Fair At Canby Next Week

After several days of very strenu-
ous work Secretary Ward B. Lawton
is able to announce that definite pro-
grams have been arranged for the
tenth annual Clackamas county fair
to be held at Canby September 18, 19,
20 and 21, and everything points to
the biggest and best exhibition in the
history of the association.

The season has been a good one in
the matter of securing representative
displays of grain, vegetables and
fruits, and under the direction of
George Lazelle of New Era, the for-
mer particularly will eclipse all for-
mer efforts.

Grounds and buildings have been
gone over and placed in good condi-
tion and the race track could hardly
be improved upon. The racing pro-
gram, under the direction of Ed For-
tune, the well known horseman, has
attracted entries from some of the
biggest horsemen of the Pacific North-
west, and fast animals will be here
from all over the state as well as
far north as Vancouver, B. C.

The Arnold Amusement company
has again secured the concession for a
Ferris wheel, carnival show, balloon
ascension and minor attractions, and
there will be entertainment for all.

The Baby Show feature will be re-
sumed this year, after trying the Eu-
genic test last year, and this prom-
ises to be as interesting as in former
years when the competition was so
keen.

Juvenile day is to be made a great
event, occurring on Wednesday, Sept.
20, when every school child in the
county will be admitted free on tick-
ets, which have been supplied to teach-
ers and clerks of the district and may
be secured from them. The district
having the most tickets given in at the
gates on this day in proportion to
their enrollment on the first day of
school this year, will be awarded a
prize of \$10. Inasmuch as all schools
of the county, including Oregon City,
are to be dismissed on this day, the at-
tendance promises to eclipse all for-
mer marks at the fair.

Oregon City day is to be made an-
other big day, the business houses
with just one exception signing an ag-
reement this week to close their plac-
es at noon on Sept. 19 and remain
closed until 6 p. m. The Southern Pa-
cific has consented to run another
special train, leaving Oregon City at
12:15, and returning will leave Canby
at 8 p. m., although there is another
train leaving for Oregon City at 6:12,
upon which the county seat people
may return home. It is understood
that the Boys' Band and the Falls-
arian Marching club will be included in
the Oregon City delegation. On this
day several prominent speakers of the
state are to make addresses, their
names to be announced later.

Governor Withycombe is to be a
guest of honor of the fair on Juvenile
day and will address the school chil-
dren.

The fair association expressed it's
regret at it's inability to get the Mo-
lalla band for Molalla day and Juve-
nile day, but the organization has dis-
banded and it was found impossible
to assemble it. In it's place will be
the well-known Garfield band, which
furnishes music for the East Clack-
amas fair each year.

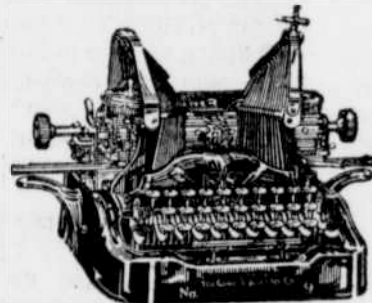
