Under the heading, "You Pay Taxes—Why Not Levy Them?", the News in a late issue calls attention to the need of an early meeting of the Eastern Clackamas Taxpayers' League for the purpose of discussing the various items which make up the County's general budget.

The importance of a good attendance from all sections of the county was well illustrated December last when only a very few were in evidence from Eastern Clackamas.

Taxpayers and some others from Oregon City and vicinity who it was hinted were not taxpayers, crowded the courtroom and voted on propositions affecting the County at large and the few who happened to be present from this end of the County could only sit and wonder what would happen next.

A motion to pay the County Commissioners a slightly larger salary than that collected by the average dog-catcher was hailed as the height of sinful extravagance and quickly voted down by the close fistied gentlemen of the county seat, while schemes involving the expenditure of many thousands of dollars which made possible the appointing of clerks, deputies, etc., were considered very wise economy by these same gentlemen, and approved with much enthusiasm and clapping of hands, I suppose on the theory that the more people that got their feet in the trough, the more the county at large would be benefited.

By all means let us have a meeting of the Taxpayers League to discuss the budget as soon as it is printed, and induce our neighbors to attend the annual meeting at Oregon City.

It's as good as a circus and the admission is free.
