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COUNTY AND STATE GO REPUBLICAN PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION STILL DOUBTFUL

Stephens Elected To Legislature Bates Defeats Ames For Constable

Clackamas county Republicans have registered substantial majorities for every nominee of their party, with the sole exception of district attorney. Hughes has a lead in the county, with only six precincts to hear from of 986. Hawley, for congress, has beaten Weatherford by more than two to one and the rest of the Republican state ticket has long leads.

Hawley is reelected in the state, as are Congressmen Sinnott from the second district and Congressman Mc-Arthur, from the third district, the latter having a hard fight against Lafferty, whom he defeated in the primaries and who ran as an independent. Hughes carries the state by several thousand.

Six of the constitutional amendments on the ballot fared well in Clackamas county. The state wide tax limitation amendment received the approval of the voters here, as did rural credits, the repeal of the Sunday blue law, anti-compulsory vaccination, ship tax exemption and the single item veto carried in Clackamas county, while the negro suffrage, land and loan amendment, Pendleton normal, brewers' amendment and the prohibition amendment lost in this county.

District Attorney Hedges was reelected over William M. Stone, the Republican nominee, who received in 78 out of S1 precincts 4791 to 5130 for Hedges.

Dr. H. A. Delman, of Canby; Harold C. Ste hens of George, and George C. Prownell, of Concord, were elected representatives in the state legislature, though J. E. Jack, the Democratic candidate, made a very good run. A. H. Eurton, the Republican nominee for joint representative, was elected in both Clackamas and Multnomah counties over Rex Lampmann, the Democratic candidate, J. E. Calavan was reelected county school superintendent without opposition, and W. A. Proctor was chosen for county commissioner over C. W. Risley. For county clerk Iva M. Harrington was reelected, as were County Treasurer Dunn Coroner Hempstead, Sher!ft Wilson and Surveyor Johnson. Dudley C. Boyles obtained a large maje ity over his Socialist opponent for county recorder, and W. W. Everhart was elected assessor over G. F. John son, Democrat.

In the entire state it appears from fragmentary returns that the follow ing constitutional amendments have been adopted:

Single item veto ship tax exemn tion, negro suffrage, Pendleton normal, Sunday closing repeal, rural credits and state wide tax limitation.

The amendments that have been defeated are the brewers' amendment, full rental land tax, anti-compuisory vaccination and absolute prohibition.

The vote on president, congressman. secretary of state and the constitutional amendments follows:

Of the eastern Clackamas districts, Estacada 1 and 2, Springwater, Viola and Eagle Creek went Democratic with George, Barton and Garfield, Republican. These figures were true in the presidential

vote, but generally in the county balloting, eastern Clackamas went as did the county at large, in favor of the Republican candi-

Apparently little "single-shotting" was done on the candidates for the legislature, as in nearly every instance H. C. Stephens of George received the high vote, with Geo. C. Brownell second and H. A. Dedman, third. Despite the strong Democratic tendency in many local districts, J. E. Jack, the Democratic candidate, received the small end of the voting.

The vote for County Commissioner was close, with Proctor of Sandy winning, especially as George and other districts near Sandy voted strongly for their neighbor.

The vote on the District Attorney was consistent, with the Republican districts standing well for Stone and the Democratic ones going for Hedges.

On the amendments and initiative measures, eastern Clackamas took a decided stand, strongly voting down the Brewers' Amendment and generally voting for all measures that carried and against those defeated elsewhere in the state.

For Constable, Edwin Bates of Estacada on the Republican ticket, defeated A. G. Ames of Estacada, the Democrat, even in the districts that were strongly Dem-

A small Socialist vote was evident, with a scattering of Prohibition strength, with the Progressives nearly eliminated.

Of all county officers, probably Miss Iva Harrington as County Clerk, received the highest endorsement locally, even as compared with other offices where no competition existed.

Has Hand Crushed Under Car
