Economical Home-made Bean Cleaner

As one of Garfield's leading young farmers this season harvested a tolerable sized crop of navy beans and as said beans are worth real money nowadays, he decided to grade, sift and clean same at minimum expense.

In order to save the trouble and expense of borrowing a neighbor's fan mill, said farmer rigged up his motorcycle after a half days work and by means of utilizing the exhaust, succeeded in blowing everything out, including the beans.

As a 15c sieve was an unnecessary expense for the grading of the beans, said farmer took a milk pan and socked it full of No. 6 shot at close range, result—one ruined milk pan, suitable for grading clover seed. Second milk pan was duly treated to a load of buck shot, result—holes too big and far apart, although shot was well aimed. Finally, sieve was made from third milk pan by hammer and nail process.

As a result of this practice of home-made appliances, said bean crop will have to be marketed at double present prices or said farmer will have to accept the responsibilities as County Fruit Inspector for another season, to break even.
