Estacada Paving Inspected

Mr. T. F. Boltz, a member of the highway engineering staff of the Portland Cement Association, was in Estacada today for the purpose of making an examination of our streets and roads.

One of the most extensive and scientific studies ever made of any type of road is being conducted by this Association of all the concrete roads in the United States. The reports are made on especially prepared blanks so that they will all be of uniform character and will present the information in the most concise form. This information will be tabulated and studied so that all of the various methods that have been used, those that have been given the best results can be noted.

The Portland Cement Association, with offices and engineers scattered through the Country, will then be in position to advise officials and communities building concrete roads as to those methods which have proved most successful.

The significance of this undertaking can be partially appreciated when it is realized that it includes a critical examination of upwards of seventy million square yards of concrete pavement, or nearly 7,000 miles of 18 foot road.

The Portland Cement Association in undertaking this work exhibits a broad minded policy, which will result in not only good to itself but be of value to every taxpayer interested in having the most reliable methods of construction used in the streets and roads for which he is taxed.
