As we prophesied three or four weeks ago, most all farm machinery took another raise Jan. 1st. Binders went up \$12.50. Mowers from \$6.00 to \$8.00 Discs about \$5.00 Drag harrows \$2.50 to \$4.00 Plows about 10% and other goods in proportion. We still have on hand at the 1916 prices one Binder, two Mowers, one Rake, one Disc, one Wagon, one Cultivator, three H. O. Plows, four 46 Plows, one 50 and one one-horse Vineyard Plow.

We will sell any of these goods at the old prices, as long as they last, until Feb. 15th.

Harness Leather has increased in price 88% in the last four months and Harness Hardware 68%. I have yet unsold, 4 sets of heavy harness that were bought before the last raise and can sell them to you at a saving of from 15 to 20%.
