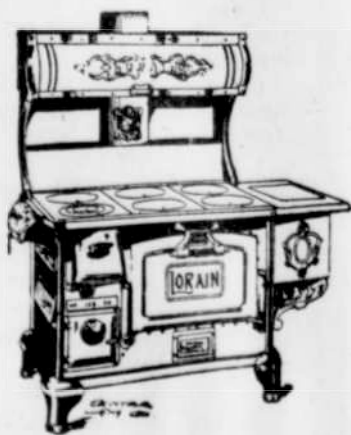

Undoubtedly, if a full detailed audit and report of the conditions of the local funds could be presented, the taxpayers would be more willing to consider further extensions and expenditures.
