PRESIDENT APPEALS TO FARMERS Estacada Should Cultivate All Vacant Property

The newspapers of the country are today flooded with appeals from all sorts of organizations, asking them to further preach the gospel of increased food production, especially as applied to the farmers of the country.

The President of the United States has added his appeal in this important matter but it is doubtful if the people of the far West or in this prosperous section of Oregon, realize the importance of this increased food production.

The food situation demands liberal production. It is imperative that every acre capable of producing crops be planted to those things which will be in demand. Specialization must be made on food stuffs that yield a large amount of nutrients per acre and that can be shipped readily.

The planting of cheap feed for livestock is urged, including grains, sugar beets, mangels, rutabagas, carrots and the like. Beans of all varieties will be in demand and aside from good profits which should come to the growers, it is their patriotic duty to increase production.

CLUB SENDS RESOLUTIONS Baseball Game For Town Flag Fund

Resolutions condeming the present conditions existent in this portion of Clackamas County, as regards the closed fish-ladders in the dams on the Clackamas River and the fish-racks in Eagle Creek and the Clackamas, with the consequent blockading of the salmon and steel-head runs—were passed and ordered sent to the State Fish & Game Commission and the Federal Bureau of Fisheries, by the F. & M. Club at Monday nights meeting.

A committee comprising Lester Hale, W. A. Jones and R. M. Standish was appointed to handle details of the matter.

A resolution was also passed, asking that the Clackamas County Court to insist on the appointment of Ben S. Patton of Estacada as County Game Warden — Messrs. Bartlett, Reed and Wright being empowered to draw up and forward same.

A committee comprising Milton Evans, Harry Reid and F. B. Guthrie was appointed to arrange a baseball game to be played in the near future, between a town team and a soldier team from Company D. stationed here. The proceeds to go towards the purchase of a large city flag.

At the request of Mayor Wright, the club passed a resolution condeming the contemplated referendum action on the herdlaw ordinance and asking the people of Estacada to co-operate with the Council's action, especially at this time of the need of patriotic gardening of the city's property.

On Monday, April 30th, Mrs. Anna Held, one of the pioneers of the George district passed away, following an illness of several years.

Mrs. Held, whose husband died eight years ago, was the beloved mother of Wm. Held, who resides on the home place and Mrs. Anna Wismer of Hillsboro, both of whom were at her deathbed.

The deceased was 76 years old, having been born in Germany April 25th, 1841.

Funeral services in charge of undertaker Chapman of Estacada, were held Wednesday. May 3rd from the George Presbyterian Church, with interment at the George Cemetery.

A call has been issued by Secy. Lawrence this week, asking that all subscribers to stock in the association, kindly make payment of same at an early date, at the Estacada State Bank, as the ready funds are now needed in furtherance of the building and equipping of the cheese-factory.

Benson Goes To Idaho

A. Benson, the popular hatchery man, who has been stationed at the River Mill Hatchery off and on for the past few years, left Tuesday for Salmon City, Idaho, where he will take charge of similar work.

During his absence, Dave Hoffmeister of Eagle Creek is in charge of the fish-racks on Eagle Creek and is attending to that part of the work.

The various women's organizations of Estacada, including the Ladies Aid Societies of the Christian and M. E. Churches and the C. I. C. are taking turn-about in making desserts for the soldiers stationed in Estacada.

Prof. Fitts and T. D. Case of the O. A. C. are in charge of the movement in this county and are calling a meeting of the representatives of all Granges and other organizations in the county at Oregon City on May 12th.

On Wednesday afternoon in Estacada, representatives of the local Granges and the Farmers' & Merchants' Club will meet, to arrange preliminary plans. Each Grange will probably send a delegate and the local club will be represented by Pres. Givens.

At the Oregon City meeting and at later local meetings, the farmers will be advised of the maximum amount of foods to be raised and of the minimum price which it is expected the government will guarantee. Also the question of more farm laborers will be presented.

Brother Of Mrs. Devore Among Missing

In the list of the missing from the American tank ship Vacuum, which was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine a few days ago, was Lieut. C. C. Thomas of the U. S. Navy, a brother of Mrs. Claude W. Devore of Estacada.

Mrs. Devore on Tuesday received advices from the Naval Department, announcing that her brother was among the missing, so little hope is held out of his having escaped.

This is the first instance of a fatality in this war which has come home to the people of this community and the sympathy of all is tendered Mrs. Devore.
