LIVE WIRES WELCOMED

Over 125 Enjoy F. & M.—
Live Wire Dinner-Meeting

When the call for dinner came at 7:30 Tuesday evening, a delegation of sixty-five hungry members of the Live Wires of Oregon City and an equal number of equally hungry members and friends of the Farmers' and Merchants' Club of Estacada, stormed the dining room of the Hotel Estacada, where they remained until about 10:30, enjoying a fine chicken dinner, with the usual after dinner speeches.

The attendance was representative, including many of the leading men and women from all sections of this community, as well as the leading county seat boosters.

The dinner was an excellent one, handled by the ladies of the C. I. C. and served by a bevy of the pretty girls of this community, and in reality was in the nature of a love-feast, with no jarring notes or discord creeping in.

The impromptu program which followed, was handled by Messrs. Eby and Givens of the two organizations, with the general tone of the speeches and talks being along general boosting lines, and in few cases dealing concretely with matters of real importance to this community or to the county at large. Talks along these lines were made by representative men from both organizations, with the local speakers confining their remarks more directly to matters of importance.

As a courtesy to the ladies, the after dinner smoking was not allowed; consequently about one hundred Disciples of Dame Nicotine, squirmed, fidgeted and chewed their unlighted cigars and cigarettes for the better part of an hour and then quietly glided from the banquet hall, to return again, as far as the doorway, after absorbing a few good inhalations of that dope, which puts the finishing touches on a good meal and leaves the victims contented and willing to sit around and enjoy speech making.

It would have been better in many ways had a formal program been arranged, for much time was consumed in the presentation of reports by the various Live Wire committees, which pertained only to their organization and city and which were of little interest to the local people and to many of the county seaters too.

With the representative crowd that was assembled, there was an opportunity to have accomplished more in the discussion of important matters, than was done, but altogether the affair was an enjoyable one and one that probably cemented closer relations between the county seat and the dissenting portions of the county.
