In the first quarter Estacada started off with a rush and twice brought the ball to the Camas 15 yard line, where they were held for downs, with Camas punting out of danger.

In the second period Camas, by a series of end runs brought the ball to Estacada's 5 yard line, where it took three downs to put across the touchdown. In the same period the crowd was brought to its feet by Ray Drill, who scooped up the ball on a fumble and raced 30 yards for E. H. S.'s first touchdown.

More scoring was done in the third period, when a Camas man intercepted a forward pass and ran 60 yards for a touch down. In the last quarter Estacada and Camas each bucked through for a touchdown.

Each man on the home team did his part in a creditable manner and the E. H. S. team of today reflects credit on Coach Rutherford, who started the season with a bunch of green youngsters.
