### DELUGE AND FLOOD DO LITTLE DAMAGE

#### Clackamas River Fills Gorge Water Foot Deep In Estacada Streets

All records were shattered by the heavy rainfall, which reached a climax Wednesday morning and which for a time threatened to do much damage, although aside from stopping all train and mail service, washing out gravelled roads and a few small bridges, did little actual harm in this community.

Owing to the topography of this immediate section, less damage was done than in other parts of the Northwest. although the full extent of the injuries to foundations of bridges, washed out roads, etc., cannot be ascertained yet.

New high water marks were established in the Clackamas and tributary streams, with the muddy waters afloat with drift wood. All sorts of ri mors were current of the weakening of the dams at Cazadero and River Mill, resultin phone inquiries from Oregon City. Gladstone and Portland. The torrent of water, with its burden of trees, roots and stumps passing over the River Mill dam was a grand sight and witnessed by many local people. In Estacada Park the Clackamas rose to within eight feet of the observation platform on the point.

In Estacada proper, the sewers were unable to handle the water, with parts of Main Street and Broadway resembling Venetian canals, with from six inches to two feet of water following 2nd St. and reaching the river through Terrace Addition Flat.


The so-called Kimmel Creek, draining the Reagan Hill canyon, broke over its banks and poured through Estacada's business section, flooding basements and in some instances ground floors.

Up to Thursday noon, no train or mail service had arrived further than Boring since Tuesday night, with the Deep Creek trest'e near Barton reported to have been weakened by the flood.

The Currinsville and Eagle Creek flats resemided lakes, with roads in places under a foot of water and the railway track cut near Alspaugh being the had of a stream.

Work from a farming standpoint was at a standstill during the flood and many humorous incidents occurred in connection with the futile attempts made in Estacada to drain the town.

## ESTACADA RED GROSS HAS NEW UFFICERS

#### Headquarters Established Membership Drive Begins In Earnest

In the places of Irwin D. Wright and Mrs. A. K. Morton, former chairman and secretary of the Estacada Red Cross Association, who have moved away. Mrs. E. W. Bartlett and R. M. Standish were this week selected to fill the vacancies as secretary and chairman. These, with Mrs. M. H. Evans as treasurer, constitute the officers of the local auxilliary.

The entire attention of the Estacada organization will be devoted to the present Red Cross Drive Membership Campaign, not only handling the city proper but affiliating with the nearby auxilliaries, in putting Eastern Clackamas County to the front again, in this, as it has in all other patriotic campaigns.

Through the curtesy of the Estacada Telephone Company, which kindly donated its Broadway store front, artistically decorated headquarters have been established, which will be in charge of Mrs. Bartlett, Mrs. Lovelace and other Red Cross workers, ably assisted by their husbands. Messrs. Givens Bartlett, and Stephens are working among the neighboring schools, clubs and other organizations in presenting this important membership campaign, besides working with dozens of others in soliciting the memberships.

Clackamas County's quota is 12,000 members and this community should exceed the thousand mark. A membership, continuing from Christmas 1917 to Christmas 1918 costs \$1., with the solicitors giving each new member a "service flag" or "button" as a receipt. In due time certificates of membership will be sent to all joining at this time.

Special posters or insignia are to be distributed to homes, where Red Cross members reside.

The public is requested not to wait for some solicitor to call upon them, but asked to come to the Estacada headquarters and take out a membership, or if in the vicinity of Eagle Creek, that auxilliary can issue the necessary flag or button receipts.

In the case of parties already belonging to the Red Cross, this drive is supposed to include them also, as all present memberships expire Christmas next.
