**Income Tax Limit**

**Extended Thirty Days**

Milton A. Miller, Collector of Internal Revenue for Oregon, advises that the U. S. Treasury Department has extended the time for the filing of income tax returns, until April 1, 1918, thus giving an additional month to the time originally provided by the War Tax Act.

Clackamas County residents, who are subject to this tax, should immediately make their returns to the representative now stationed at the Court House in Oregon City.
