SECOND RED CROSS DRIVE BEGINS MAY 20TH

Dr. Kerr, O. A. C. President Will Launch Local Campaign At Big Sunday Kally

Beginning next Sunday, politics will be relegated to the distant, with the primaries over and the Second Red Cross Drive occupying the spot-light for the week following.

A permanent organization of this county was effected at a meeting last Thursday night in Oregon City, with T. W. Sullivan of that city elected to head the county campaign. Of the various committees appointed, R. M. Standish of Estacada on the publicity committee, was the only representative from this portion of the county.

ALL READY FOR PRIMARIES FRIDAY MAY 17TH

Al. Lecal Voters Urged To Stand By Friends Of Eastern Clackamas County

Sample ballots for the Primary Election of May 17th are already in circulation, with the Republican pink ballot overshadowing in size the slip to be used by the Democrats.

Interest in this section is centering primarily on the county candidates for State Senator and Representatives, with interest in the nomination for U. S. Senator, and Governor almost as keen.

The ballot calls for the nomination of a member of the Republican National Committee, with a choice of two. Three candidates aspire to the nomination for short term U.S. Senator, with two Remoticans and as many Democrats fighting for the long-term office.

The present incumbent is seeking reselection for Congress, with six Republicans and two Democrats seeking the highest honor as Governor of Oregon.

A hait dozen Republican are looking for the State Treasurer-ship and three judges are vying for the nomination for the Supreme Court. There is no competition for the offices of Attorney General or Superintendent of Public Instruction, but considerable rivalry exists for some of Commissioner jobs.

Except for Sheriff and Treasurer of this county, the Democats have no candiates, with the big fight between Brownell and Dimick for State Senator. Three Portland men are asking for the nomination for Joint Senator and six Clackamas County men are struggling to obtain the three nominations for State Representatives, with Stephens of George being the only Eastern Clackamas candidate for any office.

For County Sheriff, three Republicans and one Democrat are listed; two men want the Clerk's office; a man and a woman are up for Treasurer, with no competition for Recorder or Surveyor and but one man is trying to get Commissioner Knight's seat in the County Court.

Every voter should do his or her duty and cast their vote early. The majority of polls will be in charge of women this year, these clerks and judges having agreed to donate their earnings to the Red Cross.

Bartlett Mayor of Estacada

A considerable shake up of officers of the City of Estacada occured at Tuesday's council meeting, when Marshall John Page resigned, with Mayor Lovelace resigning to accept the marshalship and the council appointing E. W. Bartlett as mayor.
