German Alien Females

Must Register

By official government proclamation, period of June 17th to 26th has been designated as the time when all German alien females must register.

This registration will be handled locally from the Estacada postoffice and requires that all natives, citizens, denizens or subjects of the German Empire or of the German Imperial Government, being females of the age of 14 years and upwards, now within the the United States and not naturalized as American citizens, shall register. Further information can be obtained from the postmaster.
