Cow Makes High Dive And Long Swim

A cow belonging to F. N. Cadanau of South Estacada, while browsing along the top of the Clackamas River canyon a short distance above the Estacada bridge last Saturday, slipped and fell into the river, which at that point is from 30 to 60 feet below.

It was some time before the animal was discovered and she had by that time swum and floated to a point opposite the Estacada Park. With the aid of a row boat and a rope the animal was kept afloat until a landing could be made above the bridge at River Mill, where she was dragged out upon the bank in an exhausted condition, but apparently not seriously injured.

Holstein Bull Badly Gores Owner

W. P. Ferrel of Barton, one of the best known farmers in this community, now lies at his home in a serious condition, as the result of being severely gored and trampled by a monstrous Holstein bull which he owns.

The accident occurred Tuesday morning, with the enraged animal knocking Mr. Ferrel down, and only driven off after the victim was in an unconscious condition.

An immediate examination by Dr. Adix revealed broken ribs, a left ear almost completely severed, bad scalp and body wounds, possibly a broken shoulder and internal injuries.

Estacada School Meeting To Occur July 15th.

About face! Have you thought War Savings Stamps beneath your dignity—that W. S. S. were only for the children? Have you thought W. S. S. were only for those who could invest in 25 cent units?

"Have you thought that Liberty Bonds in their higher denominations, were your principal method of helping to finance the war?"

"No matter what your subscription to Liberty Loan—War Savings Stamps are also for you.

"An exact quota, according to population, has been set. It is \$20. average for each American man, woman and child—this means the limit, \$1000. each, for those who can, to average those who cannot. Right about face—subscribe your full quota of W. S. S."

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259 Class One Men Being Called In Draft

In all, Clackamas County will be called upon to furnish a quota of 259 class one men for military service within the next thirty days.

This 259 includes 83 men who left for Camp Lewis Monday of this week; 12 men who leave for special mechanical training June 30th; 55 to go Ft. McDowell for training in artillery work on June 5th, and 89 men to be prepared for departure on July 22nd.

The draft board has received orders to mail questionnaires to the 192 class 1 men who registered June 5th, which list is expected to be available for call in about sixty days. Excluding these eligibles, who lately attained to the 21 year age, the present draft will about exhaust the class one lists and it will not be long before the class two lists will become available.

Of the 83 men who left for Camp Lewis on Monday, the dozen or more from this community made the trip to the county-seat Sunday afternoon by auto, through the courtesy of Messrs. Devore and Sarver of Estacada. Among the local boys not formerly mentioned in this list was Oscar Holmen of Springwater, who at a late hour was ordered to report as an alternate.

Of the original 83, two from this community were given deferred classifications, being John Closner of Springwater and A. Benson of Estacada, the latter being refused by the medical examining board.

Eastern Clackamas Boys In New Draft

The list of class one men from this community called among the 55 county draftees to be ready to leave for Ft. McDowell, California on July 5th, shows the names of Ernest Amacher of Garfield, James Hamilton of Viola, Arthur Jonsrud of Boring, Robert Peshall of Eagle Creek, August Genserowski of Springwater, Stanley Turel of Dodge and Frank Howard of George. Among the alternates being John C. Affolter of Eagle Creek and Wm. Krieger of Garfield.

Springwater Boy Enlists In Navy
