### License Fees

#### Increase City Income

Under the regime of Mayor Bartlett, the City of Estacada is prospering financially by the enforcement of a number of dust-covered and long-forgotten or enforced ordinances.

In the matter of the collection of water rentals alone, the city this month has been paid in full by all users and on Sunday the ordinance making it compulsory that all peddlers, fakers and keepers of amusement features, games and devices pay a city license, was enforced. This resulted in quite a sum of money obtained from the transient "near-merchants" located in the Estacada Park.

Where a stand or concession in the park is conducted and owned by the organization giving the picnic, no effort is made to enforce this ordinance, but in the instance of the transient fakers, it is a case of pay up or get out.

### Skilled Loggers

#### And Mill Men Wanted

From the office of the Adjutant General comes a call this week for publicity to be given the government's urgent need for 175 men skilled in logging and saw mill work.

This quota must be filled by volunteers by July 23rd or enough men will be drafted for this service.

The skilled workmen required are 70 chockermen, 50 head buckers, 24 doggers, 6 general saw mill foremen and 27 planer trimmermen.

All men volunteering or inducted under this call will be employed in the Northwest woods in the production of spruce for airplane manufacture.

Applications for this work may be made through the county draft board and are desired from men of draft age in Classes 2, 3 and 4.

### Garfield Ready For

#### Bumper Prune Crop

With a liberal government established prune price awaiting their products this Fall, the prune growers of Garfield and other nearby sections are looking ahead to netting a profit.

All growers are now giving their attention to their driers, which this year will be taxed to capacity, with a number of them being enlarged, including that of Walter Snuffin which is being doubly increased by the addition of three more tunnels and the Crawford brothers making similar provisions.

Mr. Snuffin spent a day in Portland this week in the interests of that district's growers, buying a thousand or more additional prune picking boxes, which means that hundreds of pickers will be employed this Fall in harvesting the crop.
