

The all-important "zero hour" of the battles in France is to have its counterpart in the campaign of the Fourth Liberty Loan in Oregon.

Battles in France are timed from an hour, or minutes of an hour. This time is known as the "zero hour" and is a secret closely guarded by the division heads. All movements of troops and all action is based on time calculatlons made from the "zero hour."

## Register September 12

The hours of registration will be from 7 A. M. to 9 P. M. on September 12, and all state and local officers are called on to make immediate arrangements for the maintenance of registration places on that day.

In case of illness on the registration day arrangements for tardy enrollment may be made with local boards. Men who expect to be absent from their homes may register by mail sufficiently in advance for the registration record to reach the board by September 12.

If a man has no permanent residence he is to register at the place he is on September 12, and those out of the country on that day are required to enroll within five days after their return.

Locally the registration will be held as follows: Precinct No. 1. the City Hall, Mrs. Yonce, registrar; Precinct No. 2, back of Odd Fellows Hall, Mrs. E. W. Bartlett, registrar. though opinions differ as to their respective merits.
